About 50 pseudepigraphal gospels have been cataloged. About 230 other peudepigraphal works are out there....so there are about 280 pseudepigraphal books altogether.

Gnosticism & docetism were beliefs labeled heretical by the early church.

Docetics didn't believe in the humanity of Christ.

Gnosticism believes many weird things like all matter is evil but spiritual things are all good (a Greek idea), the god of the OT is evil, since matter is evil then sex is either evil and shouldn't be practiced or since it will disappear in the afterworld, its OK to have sex as much as you want. Their whole view of the spiritual universe is very much what we would call NEW AGE today.
